BUZZWORTHY -

Building new relationships sometimes depends heavily on unpredictable chance events, often enabled by being in the right place at the right time. To wit: **David Eash** of Sister Bay has bees, but those at Birch Creek who care for our buildings and grounds didn't get to know about his bees until mid-July when honeybees moved into an outside wall space on the Miller Music Center at Birch Creek. The bees' comings and goings were witnessed and reported by **Leo Chavolla Barrera**, House Manager and Lights Intern.

Facilities Manager **Paul Greenlaw** and Head Maintenance Technician **Bill Schutté** put their heads together. Call Dave. He came that same day. He removed a board on the exterior wall to discover that a medium sized colony of honeybees had begun comb building behind the board. It was a wonderful little place for the bees, but they would need to be moved. Dave prepared wooden frames with string lattice to transport the combs and a box to house them. Climbing a ladder, Dave cut down seven, very white, soft, newly made combs that did not yet have honey. They looked a little bit like bubble wrap. Combs were placed on the frames and frames in the box. The bees were tolerant, and Dave moved them (hands full after hands full of bees) to their transport box without a single sting. Once all the bees had been transferred, including the queen bee, work paused for the night allowing the bees to assimilate to their new condition. The next morning, Dave took the bees home with him to establish them in a more appropriate setting.

To maintain his bee colony at home, Dave needed new bees. To maintain our buildings, we needed help from a beekeeper. A relationship, built with little more than a ladder, box, string, and wonder yielded invaluable benefits.
